Brief Bio-Data	<p>I was born in Bylakuppe, South India and from Montessori till third standard I was in Cauvery Valley Project, branch school of C.S.T. Bylakuppe. After that, my paternal Aunt took me with her to hill station of Mussourie where she was working and enrolled me in the reputed school called Tibetan Homes School. From there, I have done my 4th to 12th standard at one go, without any difficulties. It was really a fantastic journey for me. I have chosen science stream in my senior secondary school and come out topper in school with first division. Till that period, my ambition was to become a standard western Doctor but my beloved late father deferred it and preferred me to become a good Tibetan doctor rather than western medical practitioner. So without any qualm, I proceeded for medical entrance test in the mid of year 1996 in reputed Tibetan Medical College, Dharamsala and got through it successfully. It was a four year theoretical term and one year practical and last one year internship which make 6 yrs as a whole to complete to study Tibetan medical system. I took part in editorial board as a chief editor for college annual journal 'Ghang-ri-lang-tso' for two consecutive years (1999-2000). I have done my one year internship course under an experienced senior lady Dr. Yeshi Khando and Dr. Kyizom Bhuti for six month each. It was really a great experience for me to train under these two veterans Sowa-Rigpa Doctor. Both are very experienced, very confident in treating patient and aesthetically beautiful at heart in approaching the various patients. Thereby, I can somehow say that I got the real essence of Tibetan Medicine and it gives an extra boost whenever I am treating the patient with confidence and compassion at heart. It's been 3yrs since I got designated as a qualified Tibetan doctor. I have started my career as a residential doctor at Bylakuppe medical clinic, my home town for one and half year till 2004. After that I got transferred to Delhi Nizammudin clinic and it's been almost 17 months since I resided here in Delhi clinic.
